


Children Entering Care between 01/01/15 – 03/31/15 and Achieved Timely Permanency: 99








Adoption Finalizations








Number of Children Entering and Exiting Out-of-Home Care per Month










KNOWLEDGE

IDEALLY, FOSTER PARENTS AGREE TO PROVIDE A TEMPORARY HOME WHILE THE CHILD'S BIRTH FAMILY IMPROVES AND WANT VISITS TO SERVE THE GOAL OF REUNIFICATION. HOWEVER, FOSTER PARENTS CAN ALSO BE PRONE TO CERTAIN REACTIONS TO VISITATION THAT NEED TO BE UNDERSTOOD BY CASE MANAGEMENT. POTENTIAL REACTIONS INCLUDE, BUT MAY NOT BE LIMITED TO:

THE FOSTER PARENT IS CRITICAL of the birth family's parenting, lack of protectiveness and failure to prevent developmental delay, and may be unforgiving about visits missed by the parent.

THE FOSTER PARENT RESENTS the disruption of the household routine and having to deal with the child's reactions to visits.

IF THE FOSTER PARENT IS STRUGGLING for therapeutic reasons to get the child to attach to him or her; they may resent visits if they seem to weaken the child's ties to the foster parents.

THE FOSTER PARENT MAY BELIEVE the child should not be reacting so strongly to separation and may blame the child's behavior on the birth family's neglect or abuse.

THE MORE THE FOSTER PARENT CARES for the child, the angrier he/she may become at the parent who has mistreated the child.

ACTION

FOSTER PARENTS BENEFIT from being helped to understand children's reactions to visits and the importance of visitation, and in some cases being involved in visits.

FOSTER PARENTS MAY BE ABLE TO COMFORT a child more effectively if they were helped to see her regressed and aggressive behavior as a reflection of loss, instead of blaming birth parents for inadequately socializing her or viewing her behaviors as acting out against them.

FOSTER PARENTS AND CASE MANAGERS may find that there is less negative reaction by the child if visits are increased. Visits can also be supplemented by having foster parents provide telephone contact between the parent and the child.

BY ENCOURAGING FOSTER PARENTS TO CO-PARENT,

they can have the opportunity to talk with parents about routines and food and attempt to make her life in care more similar to life at home.

IF FOSTER PARENTS BECOME INVOLVED in visits, they are often able to appreciate children's attachment to parents more clearly and are able to respond more supportively. In the case of troubled children with histories of abuse and neglect who show up in clinics, schools, hospitals, and police stations, the traumatic roots of their behaviors are less obvious.....Because they are often shut down, suspicious, or aggressive, they now receive pseudoscientific diagnoses such as "oppositional defiant disorder," meaning "This kid hates my guts and won't do anything I tell him to do" or "disruptive mood dysregulation disorder" meaning he has temper tantrums.....Before they reach their twenties, many patients have been given four, five, six or more of these impressive but meaningless labels.
